will be used by Truliant for its TruOpportunity Builder Program, a program for potential small-business owners and entrepreneurs. The grant will help Truliant provide entrepreneurial education, credit counseling and strategic planning for small-business owners in five underserved areas of North Carolina and Virginia.

Tissue Engineering and Regenerative Medicine, which promotes basic research, commercial development and education in tissue engineering and regenerative medicine in North Carolina. Soker is an associate professor of regenerative medicine at Wake Forest University Baptist Medical Center. He will organize and be the chairman of the next N.C. Tissue Engineering and Regenerative Medicine annual meeting in November 2009 at Piedmont Triad Research Park.

■ The Medical Alumni Association of the Wake Forest University School of Medicine has recognized Dr. George Podgorny with its Distinguished Achievement Award for 2008. Podgorny was presented the award recently at the annual Dean's Leadership Circle dinner by Dr. William B. Applegate, the dean of the medical school.

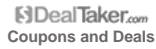
